





# Mass of the Ungels

Thank You to everyone who volunteered their time and all the participants in this years Mass of the Angels. You made it the beautiful success that it was!

In light of the increase in the number of confirmed cases of COVID-19, the Diocese of Calgary mandates the following gathering restrictions in all parishes effective immediately.

### Masses

The total maximum attendance allowed for Mass is limited to 1/3 of regular pre-COVID capacity or less if required for proper physical distancing. While the current maximum occupancy in churches are most likely already in compliance, we ask that parishes check and verify.

### Weddings and Funerals

The total maximum attendance allowed for the congregation including clergy and anyone else involved in the celebration is no more than 50 persons, or fewer if required for proper physical distancing.

### **Baptisms**

The total maximum attendance allowed for the congregation including clergy and anyone else involved in the celebration is <u>no more than 15 persons</u>, <u>or fewer</u> if required for proper physical distancing.

Each celebration of baptism will be limited to one child or the children of the family/household. If godparents do not belong to the family's cohort, we strongly recommend proper physical distancing be observed at all times.

### **Essential In-Person Meetings**

The total maximum attendance for essential in-person meetings in parish halls and meeting rooms is no more than 15 persons, or fewer if required for proper physical distancing.

The Diocese continues to encourage virtual meetings especially under current conditions.

Social gatherings are not allowed in parishes at this time.

### We also adhere to the following restrictions from Alberta Health Services.

- No social gatherings inside your home or outside of your community. Instead, socialize
  outdoors or in structured settings, like restaurants or other business that are subject to legal
  limits and take steps to prevent transmission.
- 15-person limit on social and family gatherings indoors and outdoors where people are mixing and mingling.
- Limit of 3 cohorts: your core household, your school, and one other sport or social cohort. Young children who attend child care can be part of 4 cohorts.
- Wear a mask in all indoor work settings, except when alone in a workspace or an appropriate barrier is in place.
- Employers in office settings to implement strategies to reduce the number of employees in the workplace at one time.


### "My Soul Still Dances: Living With Parkinson's"




"Please, God, help the Parkinson's people to keep faith and go on. I accept, Lord. Give me the strength to go on." So wrote Sister Adelaide Fortowsky in her diary in 2009. Sister Adelaide was an Ursuline Sister of Prelate who taught school for many years. She contracted Parkinson's in late 1990's. She kept a diary wanting to let others, especially family, caregivers, and friends, know what Parkinson's is like and that their loved ones "suffering from Parkinson's are still treasured and able to reach out to others in prayer and love". Sister Adelaide found herself growing closer to God and more sympathetic to others. She notes that while the disease diminishes all that you are, it can't rob you of who you are.


As time went on, she felt called to share her Parkinson's story with others so we, the Ursuline Sisters, honored her wish and published her diary in the book "My Soul Still Dances: Living with Parkinson's" Sister Adelaide died in July, 2016.

### 33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year A

### **ILLOGICAL WISDOM**

There is an old Chinese tale about a woman whose only son died. In her grief, she went to the holy man and asked, "What prayers, what magical incantations do you have to bring my son back to life?"

Instead of sending her away or reasoning with her, he said to her, "Fetch me a mustard seed from a home that has never known sorrow. We will use it to drive the sorrow out of your life." The woman went off at once in search of that magical mustard seed.

She came first to a splendid mansion, knocked at the door, and said, "I am looking for a home that has never known sorrow. Is this such a place? It is very important to me."

They told her, "You've certainly come to the wrong place," and began to describe all the tragic things that recently had befallen them.

The woman said to herself, "Who is better able to help these poor, unfortunate people than I, who have had misfortune of my own?"

She stayed to comfort them, then went on in search of a home that had never known sorrow. But wherever she turned, in hotels and in other places, she found one tale after another of sadness and misfortune.

The woman became so involved in helping others cope with their sorrows that she eventually let go of her own. She would later come to understand that it was the quest to find the magical mustard seed that drove away her suffering. On human level monk's suggestion to the woman was illogical wisdom but the logic was behind on the spiritual level which made that woman to understand her grief and come out to help others.

We see the same illogical wisdom in the Readings today as we reflect on the attribute of the woman who is a wise wife and manages her home and family well. She is kind, caring and generous but nothing is mentioned about the husband. Again, in our human thinking and many do question why only the woman is asked to be wise and care about her husband? However, in this great illogical wisdom, a great mystery is hidden; wisdom is to discern our call to whatever the way of life we are living in.

We have the joy of breaking the bread of God's Word, and shortly, we will have the joy of breaking and receiving the Bread of the Eucharist, food for life's eternal journey. Everyday we have the pleasure to experience the love, mercy, and forgiveness of the Lord in the Holy Eucharist. All of us, none excluded, need this, for all of us are beggars when it comes to what is essential: God's love, which gives meaning to our lives and a life without end. So today too, we lift our hands to him, asking to receive his gifts and very especially the gift of wisdom to discern our call to discipleship.

The Gospel parable speaks of gifts. It tells us that we have received talents from God, "according to ability of each". Before all else, let us realize this: we do have talents; in God's eyes, we are "talented". St. Paul reminds all of us with these words "But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all-surpassing power is from God and not from us." Consequently, no one can think that he or she is useless, so poor as to be incapable of giving something to others. We are chosen and blessed by God, who wants to fill us with his gifts, more than any father or mother does with their own children. And God, in whose eyes no child can be neglected, entrusts to each of us a mission. "Therefore, since through God's mercy we have this ministry, we do not lose heart. Rather, we have renounced secret and shameful ways; we do not use deception, nor do we distort the word of God. On the contrary, by setting forth the truth plainly we commend ourselves to everyone's conscience in the sight of God" as St. Paul writes to us in his 2<sup>nd</sup> Letter to the Corinthians.

Indeed, as the loving and demanding Father that he is, he gives us responsibility. In the parable, we see that each servant is given talents to use wisely. But whereas the first two servants do what they are charged, the third does not make his talents bear fruit; he gives back only what he had received. "I was afraid – he says – and I went and hid your talent in the ground. Here you have what is yours". As a result, he is harshly rebuked as "wicked and lazy". What made the Master displeased with him? To use a word that may sound a little old-fashioned but is still timely, I would say it was his omission. His evil was that of failing to do good. All too often, we have the idea that we have not done anything wrong, and so we rest content, presuming that we are good and just. But in this way, we risk acting like the unworthy servant: he did no wrong, he did not waste the talent, in fact he kept it carefully hidden in the ground. But to do no wrong is not enough. God is not an inspector looking for unstamped tickets; he is a Father looking for children to whom he can entrust his property and his plans. It is sad when the Father of love does not receive a generous response of love from his children, who do no more than keep the rules and follow the commandments, like hired hands in the house of the Father (Lk 15:17).

The unworthy servant, despite receiving a talent from the Master who loves to share and multiply his gifts, guarded it jealously; he was content to keep it safe. But someone concerned only to preserve and maintain the treasures of the past is not being faithful to God. Instead, the parable tells us, the one who adds new talents is truly "faithful" (vv. 21 and 23), because he sees things as God does; he does not stand still, but instead, out of love, takes risks. He puts his life on the line for others; he is not content to keep things as they are.

The parable of the talents makes us think about the relationship between how we use the gifts we have received from God and his return, when he will ask us what use we made of them. We are well acquainted with the parable: before his departure, the master gives a few talents to each of his servants to ensure that they will be put to good use during his absence. He gives five to the first servant, two to the second one and one to the third. In the period of their master's absence, the first two servants increase their talents — these are ancient coins — whereas the third servant prefers to bury his and to return it to his master as it was.

On his return, the master judges what they have done: he praises the first two while he throws the third one out into the outer darkness because, through fear, he had hidden his talent, withdrawing into himself. A Christian who withdraws into himself, who hides everything that the Lord has given him, is a Christian who... he is not a Christian! He is a Christian who does not thank God for everything God has given him!

We have received talents from God, "according to ability of each". Before all else, let us realize this: we do have talents; in God's eyes, we are "talented". God greatly appreciates the attitude described in today's first reading that of the "good wife", who "opens her hand to the poor, and reaches out her hands to the needy". Here we see true goodness and strength: not in closed fists and crossed arms, but in ready hands outstretched to the poor, to the wounded flesh of the Lord.

In the Gospel Wisdom of the master seems illogical but he trusted everyone even he knew one of them is stubborn and lazy. The master in the parable represents Jesus, we are the servants, and the talents are the inheritance that the Lord entrusts to us. What is the inheritance? His Word, the Eucharist, faith in the Heavenly Father, his forgiveness..., in other words, so many things, his most precious treasures. This is the inheritance that He entrusts to us, not only to safeguard, but to make fruitful!

While in common usage the term "talent" indicates a pronounced individual quality, for example talent in music, in sport, and so on, in the parable, talent represent the riches of the Lord, which He entrusts to us so that we make them bear fruit. The hole dug into the soil by the "wicked and slothful servant" points to the fear of risk which blocks creativity and the fruitfulness of love, because the fear of the risks of love stop us. Jesus does not ask us to store his grace in a safe! Jesus does not ask us for this, but He wants us to use it to benefit others. All the goods that we have received are to give to others, and thus they increase, as if He were to tell us: "Here is my mercy, my tenderness, my forgiveness: take them and make ample use of them". And what have we done with them? Whom have we "infected" with our faith? How many people have we encouraged with our hope? How much love have we shared with our neighbour? These are questions that will do us good to ask ourselves. Any environment, even the furthest and most impractical, can become a place where our talents can bear fruit. There are no situations or places precluded from the Christian presence and witness. The witness which Jesus asks of us is not closed, but is open, it is in our hands.

Moreover, the Lord does not give the same things to everyone in the same way: He knows us personally and entrusts us with what is right for us; but in everyone, in all, there is something equal: the same, immense trust. God trusts us, God has hope in us! And this is the same for everyone. Let us not disappoint Him! Let us not be misled by fear but let us reciprocate trust with trust! Sometimes things may look illogical in our day to day life, but we keep our eyes, minds and hearts open we can achieve great satisfaction in the Lord.

There was a young woman who took great pride in the growth and care of the flowers in her flower garden. She had been raised by her grandmother who taught her to love and care for flowers as she herself had done. So, like her grandmother, her flower garden was second to none.

One day while looking through a flower catalogue she often ordered from, a picture of a plant immediately caught her eye. She had never seen blooms on a flower like that before. "I have to have it," she said to herself, and she immediately ordered it.

When it arrived, she already had a place prepared to plant it. She planted it at the base of a stone wall at the back of her yard. It grew vigorously, with beautiful green leaves all over it, but there were no blooms. Day after day she continued to cultivate it, water it, feed it,

and she even talked to it attempting to coax it to bloom. But it was to no avail.

One morning weeks later, as she stood before the vine, she contemplated how disappointed she was that her plant had not bloomed. She was giving considerable thought to cutting it down and planting something else in its place.

It was at this point that her invalid neighbor, whose lot joined hers, called over to her. "Thank you so much! You can't imagine how much I have enjoyed the blooms of that vine you planted." The young woman walked through the gate into her neighbor's yard, and sure enough, she saw that on the other side of the wall the vine was filled with blooms.

There were indeed the most beautiful blooms she had

ever seen. The vine had crept

through the crevices and it had not flowered on her side of the fence, it had flowered luxuriantly on the other side. Just because you cannot see the good result of your labour does not mean that it bore no fruit.






### I am Blessed 2020
