





SUBJECT	New Mandatory Restrictions - State of Public Health Emergency

Due to a state of public health emergency which has been declared by the Province, the following are mandatory restrictions that apply to the Diocese and the parishes effective immediately.

<u>All parishes under the Diocese of Calgary are expected to comply with these restrictions, even in</u> <u>municipalities that currently do not fall under the list of *communities under enhanced status*.</u>

Current health and safety measures in the Diocese remain in place unless otherwise indicated by the following new restrictions which must be observed in our churches and offices.

Note: Lines that are italicized are from the Government of Alberta.

- The total maximum attendance allowed for Mass is limited to 1/3 of regular pre-COVID capacity or less if required for proper physical distancing.
- The maximum number of attendees for baptisms, weddings and funeral Masses and services is 10.
 - This also applies to Masses for the Dead, i.e. "Memorial Masses," as these involve families.
 - This includes the officiant, bride/groom and witnesses.
 - For funerals, the Diocese of Calgary does not consider the officiant as one of the 10 guests allowed.
 - Priests must always wear masks when meeting with the family for funeral preparation and with couples preparing for marriage. Proper physical distancing must always be observed.
 - This does not include staff or organizers who are not considered an invited guest.
 - For funerals and weddings, instrumentalists and soloists fall under staff. Funeral Directors are staff.
 - This applies to any facility, including places of worship and funeral homes.
 - This includes services held indoors or outdoors, seated or non-seated.
 - Receptions are not permitted.
 - This especially applies to parish halls that offer hall rentals.
- Mask use is mandatory for everyone who enters our churches and offices.

- Mask use is mandatory for all the faithful. <u>Parishioners who are not able to wear a mask</u> for medical reasons can be exempt from this regulation except when receiving Holy <u>Communion</u>. All parishioners must wear masks when lining up for the distribution of Holy Communion, including those receiving a "blessing."
- Proof of eligibility for exemption is not required when entering the church without a mask, however, we should remind everyone to wear a mask as they enter since they may have just forgotten to put them on.
- After consulting with the Office of the Chief Medical Officer, the mandatory mask regulation is now expanded to celebrants, concelebrants, lectors, deacons and cantors. The mask must be worn at all times, including when reading, preaching, celebrating the Liturgy of the Eucharist, and for cantors, including when chanting or singing.
 - Priests who have difficulties wearing a mask while celebrating the Mass can be excused from celebrating Masses with a congregation. Please inform the Chancellor or the Moderator of the Curia.
 - Priests should consider finding acceptable ways to shorten the length of the Mass while ensuring the dignity it deserves, such as the omission of chanting/singing/music and providing a brief homily.
- Masks are mandatory in all indoor workplaces, except when working alone in an office or a safely distanced cubicle or an appropriate barrier is in place.
- This applies to all employees, visitors, delivery personnel and contractors.
- This includes all locations where employees are present and masks won't pose a safety risk.
- Working from home should be considered, where possible.
- No indoor social gatherings are permitted in any setting (private homes, public spaces or workplaces).
 - Social gatherings are where people:
 - move freely to mix with others
 - have two-way conversations
 - share food, laugh, play games
 - Examples of social gatherings include:
 - wedding or funeral receptions
 - induction or award ceremonies
 - luncheons or potlucks
 - parties: birthday, retirement, baby showers, house/backyard
 - Indoor close contacts must be limited to people in the same household.
 - Work and support group meetings are not social gatherings, but attendance should be limited and public health measures followed.
 - This does not apply to service visits from caregivers, health or child care providers.
 - In-person faith group meetings can continue but must maintain physical distancing and public health measures must be followed.
 - The in-person format for <u>baptismal preparation</u> is suspended at this time as these involve families. The parish should consider offering an online format of delivery or encourage them to enrol in the online course offered by Ascension

Press. <u>https://ascensionpress.com/products/belonging-baptism-in-the-family-of-god-certification-course</u>. Enrolment cost is \$9.95 US per family. The family will be given a certificate to show that they have completed the program.

- The in-person format for <u>sacrament preparation</u> for children and youth is suspended at this time as these involve families. Instead, the parish should consider offering an online format of delivery. Portal for parish offices: <u>https://www.catholicyyc.ca/preparation.html</u>.
- The Diocese of Calgary at this time has chosen to suspend in-person sessions for the RCIA. We ask that parishes offer an online format for meeting.
- Lay associations are not allowed to gather in parish facilities at this time. They should use an online format for meeting and programs.
- Outdoor social gatherings are limited to 10 people and must not have an indoor component.
 - Backyard gatherings that require movement in/out of homes are not permitted.
 - Attendees should remain distanced at all times and follow public health measures
- Festivals and events are prohibited (indoors and outdoors).
 - Only liturgies are allowed while observing the mandatory restrictions.

Added Notes

- Celebrants, Concelebrants, & Deacons
 - Only the celebrant partakes of the Precious Blood from the chalice. Only the celebrant can drink from any chalice.
 - A separate chalice is provided whenever there is a concelebrant or a group of concelebrants. They are not to sip from the chalice but instead must self-intinct. Concelebrants are obliged to partake of the Precious Blood.
 - The celebrant will be responsible for the purification of the vessels.
 - Deacons are only given the host. They are not obliged to receive of the Precious Blood.
 - Self-intinction is reserved for priests only.
- First Reconciliation The celebration of the Sacrament of Penance must take place in a wellventilated area. Every family should be seated and separated from other families at least 6 feet away from each other while waiting for their turn. At this time, we ask that we limit the people in the area 10 people at a time.
- **Penitential Services** It is highly recommend that parishes do not offer a penitential service similar to pre-COVID days where large numbers of people gather in the church. Instead, we recommend that confessions be made more readily available and much more frequently.
- Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament This liturgy can only be held in the nave of the church. The total maximum attendance allowed for Mass is limited to 1/3 of regular pre-COVID capacity or less if required for proper physical distancing.
- Funeral Vigils & Viewings The priest or deacon is advised to only have 10 in attendance of the immediate family and friends in the funeral home for the funeral vigil. Some families may arrange for a rotational viewing to take place with 10 individuals present at a time. Priests and deacons are advised not to remain for the viewing once the vigil service has concluded.

- Interments and Graveside Services The maximum number of attendees is 10. This does not include staff or organizers who are not considered an invited guest.
- House Blessings At this time, entering homes for house blessings is discouraged. It is recommended that the priest or deacon bless the house from the outside or schedule the blessing at a later time.
- Christmas Food Hampers The Diocese of Calgary will recommend to St. Vincent de Paul Society and other similar lay associations that food hampers be assembled in homes by the people in the same household. Parish facilities should not be used for the assembly of these hampers. Curbside drop-off and pickup are strongly recommended either in the parish parking lot or at the address of the recipients. Please continue to support charitable initiatives but avoid any form of gathering at this time.
- The Use of Parish Halls for Christmas Masses Guidance on this matter will be provided before December 17, 2020.

1st Sunday of Advent- Year B

OUR HOPE LIVES FOREVER

Once, there was a farmer who was tired of various natural factors ruling the quality of his crop. So, one day he called God and said, "I am tired of all the natural nonsense happening. Obviously, you are not a farmer. You do not know what it means to farm so why don't you leave nature in my hands? I am a farmer. I know when it should rain, I know when there should be sunlight, everything is happening at the wrong times. You leave it to me."

Whether you have a good deal or a bad deal, whatever the situation is, it is very useful - you use that for your wellbeing.

God said, "Okay, nature is in your hands." Then the farmer planned his crop. So, he calls out "Rain!" And it rains. He pokes the land with his finger and sees, "Okay it's soaked up to six inches," "Stop!" Then he ploughed his field and planted maize seeds and waited for two days, "Rain!" then "Sunlight!" One day he was working in the field so, "Cloud!" Everything just happened the way he wanted, and a beautiful maize crop came. He was overjoyed.

When it was time for the harvest, he wanted to see that no birds come. He was surprised about that because when he said, "No birds!" – no birds came. He went down to his fields to harvest the maize but when he looked at the crop, there was no grain in the plants. Then he thought "What the hell is this? What did I do wrong?" He could not figure it out because he had managed everything – rain, water, and sunshine – properly.

He went back to God and asked, "I did everything right but there is no grain. Did you sabotage my crop?" God said, "I have been watching; you were in charge, so I didn't want to interfere. The rain was great, the sunshine was great, everything was fine, but you stopped all the winds. I used to always send fierce winds which would threaten your crop

but because the plants felt pushed and threatened, they put their roots deeper into the earth and so grain happened. Now you have a great maize crop but no maize."

As the maize crop used the winds to strengthen themselves, various situations in your life can either be used to make yourself stronger and better or you can sit and cry. This is the choice you have. Everything, it does not matter what happens, even the most horrific event in your life can also be used for your growth and your wellbeing. The small events of your life – your business, your marriage, your children – all these things are just a steppingstone. All these things move around the element of hope and hope for the good to come. St. James says in his letter that "never say we will do but say God willing we will do".

This week we begin our Advent season to prepare ourselves to celebrate the miraculous birth of Our Lord Jesus Christ. Advent is a time we are given to welcome the Lord who comes to encounter us, and also to verify our longing for God, to look forward and prepare ourselves for Christ's return. He will return to us in the celebration of Christmas, when we will remember his historic coming in the humility of the human condition; but he enters our hearts each time we are willing to receive him; and he will come again at the end of time to "judge the living and the dead". Therefore, we must always be vigilant and await the Lord with the hope of encountering him.

The Advent season has two parts: First part (which is from 1st Sunday of Advent to December 16) addresses the importance of the second coming of Jesus. All the readings are focused on the preparation to welcome Jesus with hope, in our midst with various signs and symbols though sometimes we don't like to hear about the end time because it seems very scary. However, Jesus always reminds us He is with us as he carries us - his name is Emmanuel.

The Second part of Advent (which is from December 17 to 24) emphasizes the importance of Jesus's first coming through the prophecies we find in the Bible. Moreover, we are also reminded that our Salvation is at hand and we need to rejoice in the Lord who was, who is and who is to come.

Today, as we light our first Advent candle, we reflect on the theme "Hope" which keeps reminding us not to lose our hearts but trust in the Lord. The two words Hope & Wait, during this Covid-19 pandemic are very crucial. Everyone is waiting with hope to see an end to this pandemic. Once again, our Province is hit with new restrictions which for many people are not encouraging but stressful. What should we do in this situation? The Holy Father encourages everyone with these words: "The person who *takes heed* is the one who, amid the worldly din, does not let himself be overwhelmed by distraction or superficiality, but lives in a full and conscious way, with concern first and foremost *for others*. With this

manner we become aware of the tears and the needs of neighbours and we can also understand their human and spiritual strengths and qualities. The heedful person then also turns *toward the world*, seeking to counter the indifference and cruelty in it, and taking delight in its beautiful treasures which also exist and are to be safeguarded. It is a matter of having an understanding gaze so as to recognize both the misery and poverty of individuals and society, and to recognize the richness hidden in little everyday things, precisely there where the Lord has placed us".

This pandemic should not let us down from the Love of Jesus as St. Paul says, "who can separate us from the Love of Jesus". In our discipleship we are asked to hope in the Lord because hope does not die. The one who accepts the invitation to keep watch, that is, not to let himself be overpowered by the listlessness of discouragement, by the lack of hope, by disappointment; and at the same time it wards off the allurements of the many vanities with which the world is brimming over and for which, now and then, time and personal and familial peace is sacrificed. It is the painful experience of the people of Israel, recounted by the Prophet Isaiah: God seemed to have let his people err from his ways (63:17), but this was a result of the unfaithfulness of the people themselves (64:4b). We, too, often find ourselves in this situation of unfaithfulness to the call of the Lord: He shows us the good path, the way of faith, the way of love, but we seek our happiness elsewhere. The Psalmist says "but the Lord takes pleasure in those who fear him, in those who hope in his steadfast love. (147:11). King Solomon in the Book of Ecclesiastes says "Vanity, vanity, everything is vanity" but on the other hand St. Peter reminds even as everything is vanity but "Blessed be God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! By his great mercy he has given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead" (1Peter 1:3).

St. Cyril of Jerusalem once said "We do not preach only one coming of Christ, but a second as well, much more glorious than the first. The first coming was marked by patience; the second will bring the crown of a divine kingdom. In general, whatever relates to our Lord Jesus Christ has two aspects. There is a birth from God before the ages, and a birth from a virgin at the fullness of time. There is a hidden coming, like that of rain on fleece, and a coming before all eyes, still in the future.

At the first coming he was wrapped in swaddling clothes in a manger. At his second coming he will be clothed in light as in a garment. In the first coming he endured the cross, despising the shame; in the second coming he will come in glory, escorted by an army of angels. We look then beyond the first coming and await the second. At the first coming we said: Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. At the second we shall say it again; we shall go out with the angels to meet the Lord and cry out in adoration: Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. The Savior will not come to be judged again, but to judge those by whom he was judged. At his own judgment he was silent; then he will address those who committed the outrages against him when they crucified him and will remind them: You did these things, and I was silent.

His first coming was to fulfill his plan of love, to teach men by gentle persuasion. This time, whether men like it or not, they will be subjects of his kingdom by necessity. Malachi the prophet speaks of the two comings. And the Lord whom you seek will come suddenly to his temple: that is one coming. Again, he says of another coming: Look, the Lord almighty will come, and who will endure the day of his entry, or who will stand in his sight? Because he comes like a refiner's fire, a fuller's herb, and he will sit refining and cleansing.

These two comings are also referred to by Paul in writing to Titus: The grace of God the Savior has appeared to all men, instructing us to put aside impiety and worldly desires and live temperately, uprightly, and religiously in this present age, waiting for the joyful hope, the appearance of the glory of our great God and Savior, Jesus Christ. Notice how he speaks of a first coming for which he gives thanks, and a second, the one we still await. That is why the faith we profess has been handed on to you in these words: He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. Our Lord Jesus Christ will therefore come from heaven. He will come at the end of the world, in glory, at the last day. For there will be an end to this world, and the created world will be made new.

Through this Sunday's Gospel our Lord is calling out to everyone "Beware, keep alert, for you do not know when the time will come". These words are not to scare us but to prepare us for his Second Coming. In today's busy & hectic world we have been lost. We do not know our identity, who we are as humans and as Christians. We are led by the world, which is in a state of denial of everything, realities of life and of faith. We are just left to follow what is happening in the world with no option and very specially during this pandemic we are left with hopelessness. However, St. Peter strengthens us and encourages us to fight against the evil "The Devil is looking like a roaring lion to eat someone, be strong in faith and stand against him".

Today as we begin our Advent season, let us trust and believe in the Lord who is our living hope very especially during this pandemic. We may be somewhat slow to understand but once we open our hearts and minds, then hope will bring new things in our lives just like the following story.

Once there was a frog and toad. One day the Frog ran up the path to the Toad's house. He knocked on the front door. There was no answer. "Toad, Toad," shouted the Frog, "wake up. It is spring!" "Blah," said a voice from inside the house. "Toad, Toad," cried the Frog "The sun is shining! The snow is melting. Wake up!" "I am not here," said the voice. The

Frog walked into the house. It was dark. All the shutters were closed. "Toad, where are you?" called the Frog. "Go away," said the voice from a corner of the room. The Toad was lying in bed. He had pulled all the covers over his head. The Frog pushed Toad out of bed. He pushed him out of the house and onto the front porch. The Toad blinked in the bright sun. "Help!" said the Toad. "I cannot see anything." "Don't be silly," said the Frog. "What you see is the clear warm light of April. And it means that we can begin a whole new year together, Toad. Think of it," said the Frog. "We will skip through the meadows and run through the woods and swim in the river.

In the evenings we will sit right here on this front porch and count the stars." "You can count them, Frog," said Toad. "I will be too tired. I am going back to bed." Toad went back into the house. He got into bed and pulled the covers over his head again. "But, Toad," cried Frog, "you will miss all the fun!" "Listen, Frog," said Toad. "How long have I been asleep?" "You have been asleep since November," said Frog. "Well then," said Toad, "a little more sleep will not hurt me. Come back again and wake me up at about half past May. Good night, Frog." "But, Toad," said the Frog, "I will be lonely until then." Toad did not answer. He had fallen asleep.

The Frog looked at Toad's calendar. The November page was still on top. Frog tore off the November page. He tore off the December page. And the January page, the February page, and the March page. He came to the April page. Frog tore off the April page too. Then Frog ran back to Toad's bed. "Toad, Toad, wake up. It is May now." "What?" said Toad. "Can it be May so soon?" "Yes," said Frog. "Look at your calendar." Toad looked at the calendar.

The May page was on top. "Why, it is May!" said Toad as he climbed out of bed. Then he and Frog ran outside to see how the world was looking in the spring and how there was greenery and brightness of the day.

Let us ask the Lord to help us to prepare ourselves during this time of this pandemic and uncertainties



with prayer and hope to welcome Jesus our Saviour who became flesh and dwelt among us. Come Lord Jesus come and fill our hearts with your love and peace.

EMAIL SCAM

Several reports of email scams have been brought to our attention. The emails have been written in a compelling way that the email addresses of the senders were not visually verified and responses were sent. Perhaps this is a reminder that when someone you know asks you to email them back and sounding desperate to perhaps check the sender's email address. The scammers have become more intelligent in acquiring the tone of how we write as clergy.


