### WE CAN TOUCH HIM

The New Testament contains many accounts describing for us the experience of the original disciples of Jesus as they found faith through their encounter with the Risen Lord. The writers of the gospels were so certain of the meetings that laid the foundations of our Christian faith that they did not attempt to harmonise the details of the stories they were handing on. They passed on these stories to share the wonder of finding faith and new purpose through encounters with the Lord's triumph – a wonder that can hardly be captured by a single account.

As our Easter liturgies recall these stories, we are like a family group listening to one another sharing personal recollections of a past event that meant a great deal to the whole family. Given from different points of view, these recollections bring an appreciation of what took place. Last Sunday we heard the story as it was recalled in the community of John's gospel. Today, we hear Luke's account of the disciples' meeting with the Risen Saviour. From all these accounts a coherent story emerges that invites the Church of every age to share in the original moment of Resurrection faith: the disciples are confused and frightened; when Jesus comes into their midst, finding faith in him is not easy or immediate; his greeting, however, and his loving acceptance of them into his abiding friendship brings them great joy, and they find full faith in him; he instructs them — all that has taken place is according to the designs of God set forth in the Scriptures; he charges them with the mission of bringing to the whole world the good news of their Resurrection faith and the 'forgiveness of sins' it brings; he promises the gift of the Holy Spirit.

The season of Easter is the season of celebrating life, not the death, because our Lord has won victory over his death. He is the author of life and came to give life and life in abundance as St. John says. However, it is the abuse of human freedom that has made the destructive world from which we need to be saved and set free. The words of Peter in the first reading suggest a

line of thought which has relevance for the world in which we live "you have killed the author of life". We could see right now what is happening in our country that people are eager to spread the culture of death. On one hand people are afraid of death but on the other hand people are not only spreading but also supporting the culture of death over the culture of life. In a recent statement the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops have condemned the culture of death and also have called the faithful to prayer for life as they condemned the Bill-C7 which expands euthanasia and assisted suicide in Canada. The statement quotes "The Catholic Bishops of Canada remain steadfastly opposed to Bill C-7, which further expands euthanasia and assisted suicide in Canada, which the government and courts have euphemistically called "medical assistance in dying" ("MAID"). We also remain deeply troubled that the Federal Government chose not to appeal the Quebec Superior Court "Truchon v. Attorney General of Canada" ruling which requires the eligibility criteria for euthanasia and assisted suicide to be expanded by removing the "reasonable foreseeability of natural death" criterion. This decision not to appeal prompted Bill C-7 and bypassed the "parliamentary review of ...provisions [for "MAID"] and of the state of palliative care in Canada to commence at the start of the fifth year following the day on which [the Act] receives Royal Assent," as provided in the original 2016 Act to amend the Criminal Code. This review, which the government had agreed to before introducing new amendments, has yet to occur. Bill C-7 goes far beyond the Truchon ruling by relinquishing and broadening some of the remaining "safeguards." As we have previously noted, one example of this involves allowing patients whose death is "reasonably foreseeable" to waive their final consent to receiving euthanasia by allowing such a decision to be made through an advance directive".

In today's world of confused moral values, who is to judge the moral guilt of many things that are done? But if what is done is a turning away from the light to darkness, from what leads to life to what leads to death, it is sinful in the sense that it is an aberration that has destructive consequences from which only God can save us. We are the people of Resurrection where death has no place because God has created everything for eternity as we read in the second chapter of the Book of Wisdom. Canadian bishops have taken a stronger stand to promote the culture of life and plead to every faithful to pray and cherish the greatest gift of life. The statement goes further to explain "The Bishops of Canada call on Catholics and all people of good will to make their voices heard in opposition to the Bill. Similarly, all Canadian legislators should recall that no law that permits the taking of innocent human life can ever be morally justified. Such a law would always violate the intrinsic dignity of the human person. The recent letter Samaritanus bonus by the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith clearly summarizes the position of the Catholic Church on this matter: It is gravely unjust to enact laws that legalize euthanasia or justify and support suicide, invoking the false right to choose a death improperly characterized as respectable only because it is chosen. Such laws strike at the foundation of the legal order:

the right to life sustains all other rights, including the exercise of freedom. The existence of such laws deeply wound human relations and justice and threaten the mutual trust among human beings. The legitimation of assisted suicide and euthanasia is a sign of the degradation of legal systems. We firmly support and uphold most categorically the inherent dignity of each and every human person as well as their inalienable right to life which the Government must respect and protect as in any democracy. Elected public officials should not avoid, shy away from or delay sincere dialogue and constructive consultations with faith and community leaders, and others, who could bring to the common reflection and societal discernment a valid perspective worthy of respect and consideration for the good of all Canadians".

Keep that statement in mind, I believe today's Gospel reading is so powerful to remind us about the culture of life that we can touch Jesus because he has a physical body like us "Touch me and see, for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have". And St. Paul says, "he was like us but sin". The two disciples are back to Jerusalem to witness the life they have experienced in the Lord as they recognized him in the breaking of the bread and St. John confirms that this bread is a bread of life that came down from heaven and however will eat this bread will live forever. St. Peter rightly claims, "you have the words of life and where shall we go".

There is another aspect related to the culture of life which we can see in the Gospel "But out of joy they still did not believe in him and they stood there dumfounded" as Pope Francis states. The joy impeded them from believing. Their joy was so great, there was so much joy that it was a "no, this can't be true" like moment. We all believe that the life we have in Jesus is real and he died for us to grant us eternal life.

Today more than ever we need to promote the culture of life and we must cherish it from conception to natural death. Also, we must remember as St. Paul says, "if we have died in him, we will also rise with him". What are we going to choose during this season of Easter? In the Book of Deuteronomy (30:11-20) "Surely, this commandment that I am commanding you today is not too hard for you, nor is it too far away. It is not in heaven, that you should say, "Who will go up to heaven for us, and get it for us so that we may hear it and observe it?" Neither is it beyond the sea, that you should say, "Who will cross to the other side of the sea for us and get it for us so that we may hear it and observe it?" No, the word is very near to you; it is in your mouth and in your heart for you to observe.

See, I have set before you today life and prosperity, death and adversity. If you obey the commandments of the Lord your God that I am commanding you today, by loving the Lord your God, walking in his ways, and observing his commandments, decrees, and ordinances, then you shall live and become numerous, and the Lord your God will bless you in the land that you are entering to possess. But if your heart turns away and you do not hear but are led astray to bow

down to other gods and serve them, I declare to you today that you shall perish; you shall not live long in the land that you are crossing the Jordan to enter and possess. I call heaven and earth to witness against you today that I have set before you life and death, blessings, and curses. Choose life so that you and your descendants may live, loving the Lord your God, obeying him, and holding fast to him; for that means life to you and length of days, so that you may live in the land that the Lord swore to give to your ancestors, to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob".

Let us celebrate the great mystery of life as we reflect on the resurrection of Lord Jesus who has set his tent among us and wipes all of tears to rejoice in his victory of death. Our mission - as those who have found Resurrection faith and the hope it brings - is to bring liberation from sinfulness in all its forms, by sharing the light and life of the Risen Lord with our struggling world.



In a world where there is so much noise, so much bewilderment, there is a need for silent adoration of Jesus concealed in the Host. Be assiduous in the prayer of Adoration and teach it to the faithful. It is a source of comfort and light, particularly to those who are suffering. Pope Benedict XV1. Please come and join us for adoration on Friday April 23 from 930am to 930 pm, in the faith room. 

# CCCB responds to Bill C-7

Canada's Catholic bishops have issued a forceful condemnation of the country's new assisted suicide law, saying the possible pressures it will place on Canadians with mental illness or disabilities are "all too real, perilous, and potentially destructive." Read review



# Vatican's new document on climate crisis



The climate crisis has a very human face. It is already a reality for multitudes of vulnerable people worldwide. Climate warming of merely 1.5°C would cause global sea levels to rise by 0.77 metres by 2100, threatening cities and crop and pasture land around the world. Projections based on current data predict a global temperature increase of 3-4°C by 2100.

The Vatican's Migrants and Refugees Section of the Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development has recently published and presented a resource document entitled, <u>Pastoral Orientations on Climate Displaced People</u>. The resource highlights the new challenges posed by climate disruption and displacement and suggests pastoral responses to the global situation and crisis.




