



5th SUNDAY OF EASTER – YEAR B

BEARING FRUIT

Once upon a time there was a huge old tree which was not only provide shade to people and animals but producing good fruit as well. Everything seemed normal but one day the branches were talking to each other. One branch said I feel miserable for not having leaves, flowers or fruit and I feel I am useless to stay with the tree. The second branch said I am useless too as I have only leaves but not flowers or fruits. The third branch said I feel happy to have leaves and flowers, but I wish I could bear fruit as well and this makes me to consider cutting myself off the tree. The fourth branch said I am happy that I have leaves, flowers, and fruit but I have a huge problem. "What problem" other branches asked her, and she replied in a very sad way "the fruit I produce, bend me so much that I get backache and people and animals damage me while eating my fruit and I too feel I should cut myself off the tree". The tree kept listening to them and then he said, "All of you must remember that you are attached to me and if you cut yourself from me, there will be no life in you".

Last Sunday we reflected on the qualities of Good Shepherd who lays down his life for his sheep and meditated on the invitation that we are called by him. This Sunday we are called to examine our Christian life to see how are we bearing fruit that will last forever?

Today's Gospel shows us Jesus during the Last Supper, in the moment He knows His death is close at hand. His 'hour' has come. For it is the last time He is with His disciples, and now He wants to impress firmly a fundamental truth in their minds: even when He will no longer be physically present amid them, they will still be able to remain united to Him in a new way, and thus bear much fruit. Everyone can be united to Jesus in a new way. If, on the contrary, one should lose this unity with Him, this union with Him, would become sterile, or rather, harmful to the community. And to express this reality, this new way of being united to Him, Jesus uses the image of the vine and the branches: Just "as a branch cannot bear fruit by itself, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in me. I am the vine; you are the branches". With this image He teaches us how to abide with Him, to be united to Him, even though He is not physically present.

Jesus is the vine, and through Him like the sap in the tree the very love of God, the Holy Spirit is passed to the branches. Look: we are the branches, and through this parable, Jesus wants us to understand the importance of remaining united to him. The branches are not self-sufficient, but depend totally on the vine, in which the source of their life is found. So, it is with us Christians. Grafted by Baptism in Christ, we have freely received the gift of new life from Him; and thanks to the Church we are able to remain in vital communion with Christ.

The Holy Bible is full of images of trees: Tree of Good and Evil and Tree of wisdom in the Book of Genesis. The encounter of Abraham with the angels took place under the tree. Jesus prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane which is called the Garden of Olive Trees (which are still alive). People are compared with the trees who trust in the Lord or do not (Psalm 1 & Jeremiah 17). The Book of Revelation 22 is full of imagery of healing from a tree.

During the Season of Easter, we are asked to understand that by remaining with the Lord, we can bear fruit. St. Maximus explores this mystery in this way "Christ is risen! He has burst open the gates of hell and let the dead go free; he has renewed the earth through the members of his Church now born again in baptism and has made it blossom afresh with men brought back to life. His Holy Spirit has unlocked the doors of heaven, which stand wide open to receive those who rise from the earth. Because of Christ's resurrection the thief ascends to paradise, the bodies of the blessed enter the holy city, and the dead are restored to the company of the living. There is an upward movement in the whole of creation, each element raising itself to something higher. We see hell restoring its victims to the upper regions, earth sending its buried dead to heaven, and heaven presenting the new arrivals to the Lord. In one and the same movement, our Savior's passion raises men from the depths, lifts them up from the earth, and sets them in the heights".

He continues to say "The light of Christ is an endless day that knows no night. Christ is this day, says the Apostle; such is the meaning of his words: Night is almost over; day is at hand. He tells us that night is almost over, not that it is about to fall. By this we are meant to understand that the coming of Christ's light puts Satan's darkness to flight, leaving no place for any shadow of sin. His everlasting radiance dispels the dark clouds of the past and checks the hidden growth of vice. The Son is that day to whom the day, which is the Father, communicates the mystery of his divinity. He is the day who says through the mouth of Solomon: I have caused an unfailing light to rise in heaven. And as in heaven no night can follow day, so no sin can overshadow the justice of Christ. The celestial day is perpetually bright and shining with brilliant light; clouds can never darken its skies. In the same way, the light of Christ is eternally glowing with luminous radiance and can never be extinguished by the darkness of sin. Therefore, John the evangelist says: The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has never been able to overpower it".

Holy Father Pope Francis says, "When one is intimately united to Jesus, he enjoys the gifts of the Holy Spirit, which are — as St Paul tells us — "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control" (Gal 5:22). These are the gifts that we receive if we remain united in Jesus; and therefore, a person who is so united in Him does so much good for neighbour and society, is a Christian person. In fact, one is recognized as a true Christian by this attitude, as a tree is recognized by its fruit. The fruits of this profound union with Christ are

wonderful: our whole person is transformed by the grace of the Spirit: soul, understanding, will, affections, and even body, because we are united body and soul".

We receive a new way of being, the life of Christ becomes our own: we can think like Him, to act like Him, to see the world and the things in it with the eyes of Jesus. And so, we are able to love our brothers and sisters, beginning with the poorest and those who suffer the most, as He did and love them with His heart, and so bear fruits of goodness, of charity, and of peace in the world. Each one of us is a branch of the one vine; and all of us together are called to bear the fruits of this common membership in Christ and in the Church.

When we are intimate with the Lord, as the vine and branches are intimate and joined, we can bear the fruits of new life, of mercy, of justice and peace, derived from the Lord's Resurrection. It is what the Saints did, those who lived Christian life in fullness and lived the witness of charity, because they were true branches of the vine of the Lord. But "to be holy does not require being a bishop, a priest or a religious.... We are all called to be holy by living our lives with love and by bearing witness in everything we do, wherever we find ourselves. We are all called to be holy as St. Luke writes "Be holy as your heavenly Father is Holy"; we must be holy with this richness we have received from the Risen Lord. Every activity, whether small or great, if lived in union with Jesus and with the attitude of love and of service, is an occasion to live Baptism and Gospel holiness to the fullest.

By abiding in the Lord, we not only bear fruit but also, we learn to give ourselves to others as the following story sums up everything: Once there was a tree and she loved a little boy. And every day the boy would come, and he would gather her leaves and make them into crowns and play king of the forest. He would climb up her trunk and swing from her branches and eat apples. And they would play hide and seek. And when he was tired, he would sleep in her shade. And the boy loved the tree very much. And the tree was happy.

But time went by. And the boy grew older. And the tree was often alone. Then one day the boy came to the tree and the tree said: "Come, Boy, come and climb up my trunk and swing from my branches and eat apples and play in my shade and be happy." "I am too big to climb and play," said the boy. "I want to buy things and have fun. I want some money. Can you give me some money?" "I'm sorry," said the tree, "but I have no money. I have only leaves and apples. Take my apples, Boy, and sell them in the city. Then you will have money and you will be happy." And so, the boy climbed up the tree and gathered her apples and carried them away. And the tree was happy.

But the boy stayed away for long time and the tree was sad. And then one day the boy came back and the tree shock with joy and she said, "Come, Boy, climb up my trunk and swing from my branches and be happy." "I am too busy to climb trees," said the boy. "I want a house to keep me warm," he said. "I want a wife and I want children, and so I need a house. Can you give me a house?" "I have no house," said the tree. "The forest is my house, but you may cut off my branches and build a house. Then you will be happy." And so, the boy cut off her branches and carried them away to build his house. And the tree was happy.

But the boy stayed away for a long time. And when he came back, the tree was so happy she could hardly speak. "Come, Boy," she whispered, "come and play." "I am too old and sad to play," said the boy. "I want a boat that will Take me far away from here. Can you give me a boat?" "Cut down my trunk and make a boat," said the tree. "Then you can sail away... and be happy."

And so, the boy cut down her trunk and made a boat and sailed away. And the tree was happy but not really. And after a long time, the boy came back again. "I am sorry, Boy," said the tree, "but I have nothing left to give you, my apples are gone." "My teeth are too weak for apples," said the boy. "My branches are gone," said the tree. "You cannot swing on them" "I am too old to swing on branches," said the boy. "My trunk is gone," said the tree. "You cannot climb" "I am too tired to climb," said the boy. "I am sorry," sighed the tree. "I wish that I could give you something... But have nothing left. I am just an old stump. I am sorry...". "I don't need very much now," said the boy, "just a quiet place to sit and rest. I am very tired." "Well," said the tree, straightening herself up as she could, "well, an old stump is good for sitting and resting. Come, Boy, sit down. sit down and rest." And the boy did. And the tree was happy . . .

Let us entrust ourselves to the intercession of the Virgin Mary and St. Joseph, so that we might be able to be living branches in the Church and witness to our faith in a consistent manner.




Vatican's new document on climate crisis

levels to rise by 0.77 metres by 2100, threatening cities and crop and pasture land around the world. Projections based on current data predict a global temperature increase of 3-4°C by 2100.

The Vatican's Migrants and Refugees Section of the Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development has recently published and presented a resource document entitled, <u>Pastoral Orientations on Climate Displaced People</u>. The resource highlights the new challenges posed by climate disruption and displacement and suggests pastoral responses to the global situation and crisis.




Consecration to Saint Joseph
