





HOW TO AVOID BEING SCAMMED?

DON'T TAKE THE BAIT



You are informed of a problem/crisis.



You receive a message that brings to your attention a problematic situation on your email, computer, phone, or even a letter. It may be about you being fined, your computer being hacked requiring you to immediately act in order to save your data/information, you are being charged for something you didn't order or purchase, or a friend or colleague needs a favour.

You panic and feel the need to act immediately, and they provide you with the solution.



The message that informed you of the problem also provides you with the alleged solution to click on the link or to phone the number they have provided.

DON'T TAKE THE BAIT!

Do not use the link or any contact information they provided. Move away, and think calmly.

For example: your bank emailed you that your credit card or bank account has been charged an amount you didn't authorize, and they think that you have been scammed. Stop & pause. Do not reply the sender or click any links in the email, and do not call using the contact information shared in the email. Instead, contact your bank directly in person at the branch, or by phone using the number you normally use to access the bank's call center agent, or online through your bank app or regular online banking method.

DEATH IS A BEGINNING NOT THE END

"I don't want to die" are words we hear almost everyday for two reasons: First we do not want to lose what we have including our families and properties etc. and secondly the attachment to the world. It is strange that most people who believe there is life after death, are still afraid of death. "We are neither eternal nor ephemeral: we are men and women on a journey in time, time that begins, and time that ends." Pope Francis invited everyone "to pray, and to ask for the grace of a sense of time" in order not to be "imprisoned" by the present moment, "closed in on oneself." Death, the Pope said, "is a fact that affects everyone." For some it comes later, for some sooner, "but it comes." As it is also written in the Book of Sirach (38:22) "Remember his fate, for yours is like it; yesterday it was his, and today it is yours".

But there is the temptation of the present moment that takes hold of life and brings you to go wandering in this selfish labyrinth of the moment, without a future, always coming and going, coming and going, no? And the journey ends in death, we all know that. And for this reason, the Church has always tried to reflect on this our end: not death."

It is helpful, Pope Francis said, to repeat often, "I am not the master of time," because this reflection "saves us from the illusion of the moment, of viewing life like a chain with links made up of individual moments," a transitory life "that makes no sense." We say to ourselves, "I am on a journey, and I have to look forward"; but, the Pope said, we should also consider that "death is a legacy," — not a material inheritance, but a legacy of memory. In the Book of Leviticus, it is written "The land shall not be sold in perpetuity, for the land is mine; with me you are but travellers and tenants". I think is the way of our life is though short lived, but we must live in and with the Lord.

And so, we should ask ourselves: "What would be my legacy if God were to call me today? What legacy would I leave as a testimony of my life?" It is a good question to ask ourselves. And thus, we can prepare ourselves, because each one of us... none of us will remain "as a relic." We must all go down this path.

Finally, the Pope said, "death is a memory," an "anticipated memory" to reflect upon: When I die, what would I like to have done in this decision that I must make today, in my way of living

today? It is an anticipated memory that illuminates the "moment" of today, illuminating with the fact of death the decisions that I must make every day.

What would happen to us after we die, and I guess the following is just a glimpse of what will happen after our death.

A sick man turned to his doctor as he was preparing to leave the examination room and said, "Doctor, I am afraid to die. Tell me what's on the other side," Very quietly, the doctor said, "I don't know..." "You don't know? You're a Christian Man, and don't know what's on the other side?" The doctor was holding the handle of the door; on the other side came a sound of scratching and whining, and as he opened the door, a dog sprang into the room and leaped on him with an eager show of gladness and love.

Turning to the patient, the doctor said, "Did you notice my dog? He has never been in this room before. He did not know what was inside. He knew nothing except that his master was here, and when the door opened, he sprang in without fear. I know little of what is on the other side of death, but I do know one thing...I know my Master is there and that is enough."

St. Aloysius Gonzaga who was infected with the plague in Italy while helping other people and died in the age of 23. He wrote a letter to his mother encouraging her to not be sad and afraid but believe in the Lord: "May the comfort and grace of the Holy Spirit be yours for ever, most honored lady. Your letter found me lingering still in this region of the dead, but now I must rouse myself to make my way on to heaven at last and to praise God for ever in the land of the living; indeed, I had hoped that before this time my journey there would have been over. If charity, as Saint Paul says, means to weep with those who weep and rejoice with those who are glad, then, dearest mother, you shall rejoice exceedingly that God in his grace and his love for you is showing me the path to true happiness, and assuring me that I shall never lose him.

The divine goodness, most honored lady, is a fathomless and shoreless ocean, and I confess that when I plunge my mind into thought of this it is carried away by the immensity and feels quite lost and bewildered there. In return for my short and feeble labors, God is calling me to eternal rest; his voice from heaven invites me to the infinite bliss I have sought so languidly and promises me this reward for the tears I have so seldom shed.

Take care above all things, most honored lady, not to insult God's boundless loving kindness; you would certainly do this if you mourned as dead one living face to face with God, one whose prayers can bring you in your troubles more powerful aid than they ever could on earth. And our parting will not be for long; we shall see each other again in heaven; we shall be united with our Savior; there we shall praise him with heart and soul, sing of his mercies for ever, and enjoy eternal happiness. When he takes away what he once lent us, his purpose is to store our treasure elsewhere more safely and bestow on us those very blessings that we ourselves would most choose to have.

I write all this with the one desire that you and all my family may consider my departure a joy and favor and that you especially may speed with a mother's blessing my passage across the waters till I reach the shore to which all hopes belong. I write the more willingly because I have no clearer way of expressing the love and respect, I owe you as your son".

Death is painful, hurtful, heartbreaking and damaging and no one wants to see anyone dying but the Sacred Scripture says, "anyone who is born, must taste death". In the Book of Song of Songs, we read "Love is as strong as death is" and the Book of Ecclesiastes reminds us with these words "There is a time for everything under the sun, a time to be born and a time to die...". However, for us who believe in the Lord we do know that death is not the end, but the beginning of eternal life and the First Reading explains "God did not make death, and he does not delight in the death of the living. For he created all things so that they might exist; the generative forces of the world are wholesome, and there is no destructive poison in them, and the dominion of Hades is not on earth. For righteousness is immortal".

In the Gospel we could free the pain of the father who did not want his young daughter to die and come to the Lord. Why did he came to Jesus?

- 1. First, he knew that Jesus has the power to heal and give life. Martha in the like manner believed in Jesus "if you were here my brother wouldn't have died but still, I believe that whatever you will ask God, he will give you".
- 2. He overheard the news that his daughter had died but kept walking with the Lord who told him "Do not fear, only believe".
- 3. He saw despite the unbelief of many, Jesus held the hand the of the young daughter and rose her up from the death bed to life.

Looking at the faith of the father in Jesus we can understand how important his presence is in our lives. St. Paul keeps reminding us to believe in him "if we have died with him, we will also rise with him". Like a father in the Gospel, we must have firm faith in the Lord who says "Do not let your hearts be troubled, believe in God, believe also in me" because he is the way, the truth, and the life. He is the life and the resurrection. Death is not the end but beginning of "The Best is yet to come".

"There was a young woman who had been diagnosed with a terminal illness and had been given three months to live. So as she was getting her things 'in order,' she contacted her Pastor and had him come to her house to discuss certain aspects of her final wishes.

She told him which songs she wanted sung at the service, what scriptures she would like read, and what outfit she wanted to be buried in. Everything was in order and the Pastor was preparing to leave when the young woman suddenly remembered something very important to her.

'There's one more thing,' she said excitedly.

'What's that?' came the Pastor's reply.

'This is very important,' the young woman continued. 'I want to be buried with a fork in my right hand.'

The Pastor stood looking at the young woman, not knowing quite what to say.

'That surprises you, doesn't it?' the young woman asked.

'Well, to be honest, I'm puzzled by the request,' said the Pastor.

The young woman explained. 'My grandmother once told me this story, and from that time on I have always tried to pass along its message to those I love and those who need encouragement. In all my years of attending socials and dinners, I always remember that when the dishes of the main course were being cleared, someone would inevitably lean over and say, 'Keep your fork.' It was my favorite part because I knew that something better was coming, like velvety chocolate cake or deep-dish apple pie. Something wonderful, and with substance!'

'So, I just want people to see me there in that casket with a fork in my hand and I want them to wonder, 'What's with the fork?!' Then I want you to tell them: 'Keep your fork. The best is yet to come.'

The Pastor's eyes welled up with tears of joy as he hugged the young woman goodbye. He knew this would be one of the last times he would see her before her death. But he also knew that the young woman had a better grasp of heaven than he did. She had a better grasp of what heaven would be like than many people twice her age, with twice as much experience and knowledge. She KNEW that something better was coming.

At the funeral people were walking by the young woman's casket and they saw the cloak she was wearing and the fork placed in her right hand. Over and over, the Pastor heard the question, 'What's with the fork?' And over and over again he smiled.

During his message, the Pastor told the people of the conversation he had with the young woman shortly before she died. He also told them about the fork and about what it symbolized to her. He told the people how he could not stop thinking about the fork and told them they probably would not be able to stop thinking about it either. He was right."

So, the next time you reach down for your fork let it remind you, ever so gently, that the best is yet to come. Friends are a very rare jewel, indeed. They make you smile and encourage you to succeed. Cherish the time you have, and the memories you share. Being friends with someone is not an opportunity, but a sweet responsibility.

And just remember...keep your fork!

The BEST is yet to come!"


Death is not easy to accept under any circumstances but on the other we must not allow death to keep us down. In the Book of Sirach, we read how to let our tear fall of the deceased but not to injure ourselves with the grief.

"My child, let your tears fall for the dead, and as one in great pain begin the lament. Lay out the body with due ceremony, and do not neglect the burial. Let your weeping be bitter and your wailing fervent; make your mourning worthy of the departed, for one day, or two, to avoid criticism; then be comforted for your grief. For grief may result in death, and a sorrowful heart saps one's strength. When a person is taken away, sorrow is over; but the life of the poor weighs down the heart. Do not give your heart to grief; drive it away and remember your own end. Do not forget, there is no coming back; you do the dead no good, and you injure yourself. Remember his fate, for yours is like it; yesterday it was his, and today it is yours. When the dead

is at rest, let his remembrance rest too, and be comforted for him when his spirit has departed" (38:16-23).

Let us continue to pray for our deceased brothers and sisters and believe in the words of St. John "And I heard a voice from heaven saying, "Write this: Blessed are the dead who from now on die in the Lord." "Yes," says the Spirit, "they will rest from their labors, for their deeds follow them" (Revelation 14:13).

May the souls of all the faithful departed rest in the peace of Christ. Amen



To express the closeness of God and of the church to every older person, Pope Francis has chosen "I am with you always" from the Gospel of Matthew as the theme for the first World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly on July 25, 2021. The Pope's full message for the World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly was published yesterday on June 22.

On the occasion of the First World Day of Grandparents and the Elderly, Pope Francis also grants Plenary Indulgences to grandparents, the elderly and all the faithful who participate "motivated by a true spirit of penance and charity."

The Plenary Indulgence will be granted under the usual conditions: sacramental confession, Eucharistic communion and prayer, according to the intentions of the Supreme Pontiff during the solemn celebration he will preside over in St. Peter's Basilica or at the various functions that will be held throughout the world. "This Court of Mercy also grants the Plenary Indulgence on this same day to the faithful who devote adequate time to actually or virtually visiting their elderly brothers and sisters in need or in difficulty (such as the sick, the abandoned, the disabled and other similar cases)," the note reads. Plenary Indulgence may also be granted to those who are unable to leave their homes for serious reasons and "unite themselves spiritually to the sacred functions of the World Day, offering to the Merciful God their prayers, pains or sufferings of their lives, especially during the transmission, through the means of television and radio, but also through the new means of social communication."

The Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart of Jesus on the Friday following the second Sunday after Pentecost. The term "Sacred Heart of Jesus" denotes the entire mystery of Christ, the totality of his being, and his person considered in its most intimate essential: Son of God, uncreated wisdom; infinite charity, principal of the salvation and sanctification of mankind. The "Sacred Heart" is Christ, the Word Incarnate, Saviour, intrinsically containing, in the Spirit, an infinite divine-human love for the Father and for his brothers.
