



## Why do we light candles at Holy Mass?

The liturgical use of candles during Mass calls for at least two lit candles to be placed on or next to the altar. We could use even four or six candles for special feasts, and then those may be carried in procession (GIRM no. 117). The original use of lit candles was functional; there was no electricity. Therefore, candles were necessary even in daytime because churches tended to be dark. Candles are no longer functional, but symbolic. In the context of the Gospel, they help us remember that Christ is the Light of the World and we, as the body of Christ, are to be a light that shines in the darkness of our world.

## Why do we have candles at the ambo (pulpit)?

This practice underscores the importance of both the tables ("ambo" comes from the Greek word meaning "reading table") of the Word and the table of the Eucharist. Our first focus is on the Table of the Word (Liturgy of the Word) that's why we light candles at the ambo. Secondly our celebration of the Holy Eucharist emphasises on the importance of the Table of the Eucharist, that's why we light candles around the altar during offertory to remind us to focus our eyes on the Holy Sacrifice of the Eucharist. However, in the Roman Catholic Church, the liturgy of the Word cannot be separated from the liturgy of the Eucharist. We must remember that neither is "finished;" we are to continue to live this out in our lives, schools, homes and communities. We are truly to be Christ to others we encounter.

#### **CALLED TO HEAL**

One Saturday night, a pastor was working late and decided to call his wife before he left for home. It was about 10:00 PM, but his wife did not answer the phone. The pastor let it ring many times. He thought it was odd that she did not answer but decided to wrap up a few things and try again in a few minutes. When he tried again, she answered right away. He asked her why she had not answered before, and she said that it had not rung at their house. They brushed it off as a fluke and went on their merry ways.

The following Monday, the pastor received a call at the church office, which was the phone that he had used that Saturday night. The man that he spoke with wanted to know why he had called on Saturday night. The pastor could not figure out what the man was talking about.

Then the man said, "It rang and rang, but I did not answer."

The pastor remembered the mishap and apologized for disturbing him, explaining that he had intended to call his wife.

The man said, "That's okay. Let me tell you, my story. You see, I was planning to commit suicide on Saturday night, but before I did, I prayed, 'God if you're there, and you don't want me to do this, give me a sign now.' At that point, my phone started to ring. I looked at the caller ID, and it said, 'Almighty God'. I was afraid to answer!"

God has chosen people to go out and bring healing, but people did not want to be healed because they want to follow their own stubborn hearts. In the First Reading we come to know about the life of Prophet Amos who was a herdsman and called to prophesy to the house of Israel but did not want to heed as God called them "rebellious house" in the First Reading of last Sunday. There was a time when Israelites trusted more in the humans than God and Prophet Jeremiah has compared those people with the plant growing in the desert. However, he did believe that God has the power to heal "if you will save us, we will be saved and if you heal us, we will be healed". The healing only comes if we listen and answer to his call who says, "come and see".

The following is the testimony of an unknown man:

"Since a young age, I remember a vision of Jesus. A vision that would fill me with happiness and joy in a way nothing else could. In the vision, Jesus would show me His power, and tell me that I was His son

and belonged to Him. Growing up in Somalia, kids would make fun of what I had seen. In 2014, I had come to the USA. At that time, Revive Twin Cities was going on. A team from the outreach prayed for me, and as they prayed, the vision from my childhood returned. I was invited to Revive Twin Cities and given a Bible. I could feel the love and compassion found in His people. More and more joy kept filling my heart as they taught me more about Him. As I started to read the Bible, and learn more, I began to ask, "What can I do, Lord?" I prayed and asked others for prayer about this school, and God led me here." And found the answer that God is calling me to serve him and heal other people."

To receive healing, we must follow Jesus because he calls us to go out to heal other people. In the recent time we have seen so much, anger, sorrow, and grief in Canada over the discoveries of the graves and many people have acted harshly rather than listening to the call of Jesus for healing and reconciliation. Are we not called to bring healing to one another? Absolutely we are and that is the message we see in the Gospel today. The Gospel tells of how Jesus sends his disciples into the world to bring healing, just as He Himself came into the world to heal. To heal the root of sin in us, the original sin. Healing is a bit like creating from anew. Jesus recreated us from the root and then allowed us to move forward with his teaching, with his doctrine, a doctrine that heals. But the first requisite is that there be conversion. Conversion is the first step of healing in the sense that it opens the heart so that the Word of God may enter. If someone is sick and refuses to go to the doctor he will not be healed. As Christians, we may do many good things, but if our hearts our closed, its only like we are putting veil on our face and nothing else. To proclaim so that people may convert, one requires authority that comes from being like Jesus.

In the Gospel Jesus instructs the Apostles to take nothing for the journey but a walking stick - no food, no sack, no money in their belts. If we want to bring to healing to others, we then must empty ourselves from all the worldly pleasures and desires. In the words of Pope Francis "The apostle must be a pastor who does not seek sheep's milk, who does not seek sheep's wool. As expressed by Saint Augustine the shepherd who seeks milk seeks money, and the shepherd who seeks wool likes to dress with vanity".

Jesus told the Apostles "Whatever place does not welcome you or listen to you, leave there and shake the dust off your feet", but do so with meekness and humility. If an apostle, an envoy, one of us goes, with his nose in the air, believing himself superior to the others or because of self-interest looking for some human interest he will never heal anyone, he will never succeed in opening anyone's heart, because his word will have no authority. After having exhorted to conversion, the Twelve drove out many demons and they could do so because they had the authority to say "This is a demon! This is a sin." This authority is not the authority of someone who speaks down to people, but of someone who is interested in people. Demons flee before humility, before the power of Christ's name with which the apostle carries out his mission, because demons cannot bear that sins be healed.

All Christians can bring healing, not only priests and bishops: "each of us has the power to heal his brother or sister." We all need to be healed, and we can all heal others if we are humble and meek: with a good word, with patience, with a glance.

The Lord will shower down blessings, and our land will yield its increase". These are the words of the Psalm. We are invited to celebrate this mysterious communion between God and his People, between God and us. The rain is a sign of his presence, in the earth tilled by our hands. It reminds us that our communion with God always brings forth fruit, always gives life. This confidence is born of faith, from knowing that we depend on grace, which will always transform and nourish our land.

During every mass we attend, the words of the centurion are repeated "Lord I am not worthy but if you will say the word, my soul will be healed". Isn't it amazing to experience that how the Holy Eucharist is

healing us as we touch the Lord with our own hands and taste him with our tongue. We are called by Jesus to bring the same saving and healing power of him to other people. Jesus does not send them out as men of influence, landlords, officials armed with rules and regulations. Instead, he makes them see that the Christian journey is simply about changing hearts. One's own heart first, and then help to transform the hearts of others. It is about learning to live differently, under a different law, with different rules. It is about turning from the path of selfishness, conflict, division, and superiority, and taking instead the path of life, generosity, and love. It is about passing from a mentality which domineers, stifles, and manipulates to a mentality which welcomes, accepts, and cares.

How many of us have gone out to bring healing? Do we heal people in the name of Jesus, or do we show our own power to them?

The Church is a mother with an open heart. She knows how to welcome and accept, especially those in need of greater care, those in greater difficulty. The Church, as desired by Jesus, is the home of hospitality. And how much good we can do, if only we try to speak this language of hospitality, this language of receiving and welcoming. How much pain can be soothed, how much despair can be allayed in a place where we feel at home! This requires open doors, especially the doors of our heart. Welcoming the hungry, the thirsty, the stranger, the naked, the sick, the prisoner (Mt 25:34-37), the leper and the paralytic. Welcoming those who do not think as we do, who do not have faith or who have lost it. And sometimes, we are to blame. Welcoming the persecuted, the unemployed. Welcoming the different cultures, of which our earth is so richly blessed. Welcoming sinners, because each one of us is also a sinner.

God never closes off horizons; he is never unconcerned about the lives and sufferings of his children. God never allows himself to be outdone in generosity. He sends us his Son, he gives him to us, he hands him over, he shares him... so that we can learn the way of fraternity, of self-giving. In a definitive way, he opens a new horizon; he is a new word which sheds light on so many situations of exclusion, disintegration, loneliness, and isolation. He is a word which breaks the silence of loneliness.

St. Augustine encourages everyone to show charity to others because by acting in the like manners means we are bringing healing to others: "We entreat you, brothers, as earnestly as we are able, to have charity, not only for one another, but also for those who are outside the Church. Of these some are still pagans, who have not yet made an act of faith in Christ. Others are separated, insofar as they are joined with us in professing faith in Christ, our head, but are yet divided from the unity of his body. My friends, we must grieve over these as over our brothers; and they will only cease to be so when they no longer say our Father.

The prophet refers to some men saying: When they say to you: You are not our brothers, you are to tell them: You are our brothers. Consider whom he intended by these words. Were they the pagans? Hardly, for nowhere either in Scripture or in our traditional manner of speaking do we find them called our brothers. Nor could it refer to the Jews, who do not believe in Christ. Read Saint Paul and you will see that when he speaks of "brothers," without any qualification, he refers always to Christians. For example, he says: Why do you judge your brother or why do you despise your brother? And again: You perform iniquity and common fraud, and this against your brothers.

Those then who tell us: You are not our brothers, are saying that we are pagans. That is why they want to baptize us again, claiming that we do not have what they can give. Hence their error of denying that we are their brothers. Why then did the prophet tell us: Say to them: You are our brothers? It is because we acknowledge in them that which we do not repeat. By not recognizing our baptism, they deny that we are their brothers; on the other hand, when we do not repeat their baptism but acknowledge it to

be our own, we are saying to them: You are our brothers. If they say, "Why do you seek us? What do you want of us?" we should reply: You are our brothers. They may say, "Leave us alone. We have nothing to do with you." But we have everything to do with you, for we are one in our belief in Christ; and so, we should be in one body, under one head.

Further he adds "And so, dear brothers, we entreat you on their behalf, in the name of the very source of our love, by whose milk we are nourished, and whose bread is our strength, in the name of Christ our Lord and his gentle love. For it is time now for us to show them great love and abundant compassion by praying to God for them. May he one day give them a clear mind to repent and to realize that they have nothing now but the sickness of their hatred, and the stronger they think they are, the weaker they become. We entreat you then to pray for them, for they are weak, given to the wisdom of the flesh, to fleshly and carnal things, yet they are our brothers. They celebrate the same sacraments as we, not indeed with us, but still the same. They respond with the same Amen, not with us, but still the same. So, pour out your hearts for them in prayer to God".

Today let us recognize our call to bring healing to other people so that we may have peaceful world where everyone is respected equally and loved with great care. I would like to end my reflection (though I already have shared with you before) with the following poem written by unknown author to remind ourselves that our healing and healing of others only comes from Jesus.

Before **U** were thought of or time had begun, God had stuck **U** in the name of His Son.

And each time **U** pray, you'll see it's true, you can't spell out Jes**U**s and not include **U**.

You are a pretty big part of His wonderful name, For **U**, he was born; that's why He came.

And His great love for **U** is the reason that he died, It even takes **U** to spell cr**U**cified.

Isn't it thrilling and splendidly grand, He rose from the dead with **U** in His plan.

The stones split away, the gold tr**U**mpet blew, and this word ress**U**rection is spelled with a **U**.

When Jesus left the earth at His upward ascension, He felt there was one thing He just had to mention.

Go into the world and tell them it's true, That I love them all-Just like I love **U**.

So many great people are spelled with a **U**, Don't they have the right to know Jes**U**s too?


It all depends now on what **U** will do, He'd like them to know, but it all starts with **U**.

On the night of Wednesday, June 30, more than 10 churches in Calgary were vandalized. These are churches of Catholic parishes including the Cathedral of St. Mary and of the Presbyterian and Evangelical faith communities defaced. The incidents have been reported to the Calgary Police Service and the investigation is being conducted by the Calgary Police Hate Crimes Unit. The Diocese will continue to cooperate with the police and the provincial government that have reached out to offer assistance.


