

#### Vincentian Corner


The Society of St. Vincent de Paul assists people in need right here in our own community and surrounding area.



#### MARRIAGE: A NEVER-ENDING LOVE JOURNEY

According to Catechism of the Catholic Church "Christ instituted the sacraments of the new law. There are seven: Baptism, Confirmation (or Chrismation), the Eucharist, Penance, the Anointing of the Sick, Holy Orders and Matrimony. The seven sacraments touch all the stages and all the important moments of Christian life: they give birth and increase, healing, and mission to the Christian's life of faith. There is thus a certain resemblance between the stages of natural life and the stages of the spiritual life.". Furthermore, CCC continues to explore the real meaning of the marriage for the faithful in this way: "The matrimonial covenant, by which a man and a woman establish between themselves, a partnership of the whole of life, is by its nature ordered toward the good of the spouses and the procreation and education of offspring; this covenant between baptized persons has been raised by Christ the Lord to the dignity of a sacrament. Sacred Scripture begins with the creation of man and woman in the image and likeness of God and concludes with a vision of "the wedding-feast of the Lamb." Scripture speaks throughout of marriage and its "mystery," its institution and the meaning God has given it, its origin and its end, its various realizations throughout the history of salvation, the difficulties arising from sin and its renewal "in the Lord" in the New Covenant of Christ and the Church.

"The intimate community of life and love which constitutes the married state has been established by the Creator and endowed by him with its own proper laws.... God himself is the author of marriage." The vocation to marriage is written in the very nature of man and woman as they came from the hand of the Creator. Marriage is not a purely human institution despite the many variations it may have undergone through the centuries in different cultures, social structures, and spiritual attitudes. These differences should not cause us to forget its common and permanent characteristics. Although the dignity of this institution is not transparent everywhere with the same clarity, some sense of the greatness of the matrimonial union exists in all cultures. "The well-being of the individual person and of both human and Christian society is closely bound up with the healthy state of conjugal and family life." "God who created man out of love also calls him to love the fundamental and innate vocation of every human being. For man is created in the image and likeness of God who is himself love. Since God created him man and woman, their mutual love becomes an image of the absolute and unfailing love with

which God loves man. It is good, very good, in the Creator's eyes. And this love which God blesses is intended to be fruitful and to be realized in the common work of watching over creation: "And God blessed them, and God said to them: 'Be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth and subdue it".

"Holy Scripture affirms that man and woman were created for one another: "It is not good that the man should be alone." The woman, "flesh of his flesh," i.e., his counterpart, his equal, his nearest in all things, is given to him by God as a "helpmate"; she thus represents God from whom comes our help. "Therefore, a man leaves his father and his mother and cleaves to his wife, and they become one flesh." The Lord himself shows that this signifies an unbreakable union of their two lives by recalling what the plan of the Creator had been "in the beginning": "So they are no longer two, but one flesh."

As a priest I have attended many weddings ceremonies and officiated as well. It always surprises me to see the reactions of the grooms and brides on their wedding day, how happy they are and the love they have each other is beyond expression. I always ask one question whenever I officiate any wedding: "What was the most important aspect of his/her life that you decided to marry him/her? This week I want all the married couples to reflect on this question. And I guarantee you, you will fall in love again with your spouse. After reflecting on the question, read the following story to each other. I can assure you that you will never fail in your love journey which never ends like the wedding ring you wear.

"When I got home that night as my wife served dinner, I held her hand and said, I've got something to tell you. She sat down and ate quietly. Again, I observed the hurt in her eyes. Suddenly I didn't know how to open my mouth. But I had to let her know what I was thinking. I want a divorce. I raised the topic calmly.

She didn't seem to be annoyed by my words, instead she asked me softly, why?

I avoided her question. This made her angry. She threw away the chopsticks and shouted at me, you are not a man! That night, we didn't talk to each other. She was weeping. I knew she wanted to find out what had happened to our marriage. But I could hardly give her a satisfactory answer; she had lost my heart to Jane. I didn't love her anymore. I just pitied her!

With a deep sense of guilt, I drafted a divorce agreement which stated that she could own our house, our car, and 30% stake of my company.

She glanced at it and then tore it into pieces. The woman who had spent ten years of her life with me had become a stranger. I felt sorry for her wasted time, resources, and energy but I could not take back what I had said for I loved Jane so dearly. Finally, she cried loudly in front of me, which was what I had expected to see. To me her cry was a kind of release. The idea of divorce which had obsessed me for several weeks seemed to be firmer and clearer now.

The next day, I came back home very late and found her writing something at the table. I didn't have supper but went straight to sleep and fell asleep very fast because I was tired after an eventful day with Jane.

I woke up, she was still there at the table writing. I just did not care so I turned over and went back to sleep again.

In the morning she presented her divorce conditions: she didn't want anything from me but needed a month's notice before the divorce. She requested that in that one month we both

struggle to live as normal a life as possible. Her reasons were simple: our son had his exams in a month's time, and she didn't want to disrupt him with our broken marriage.

This was agreeable to me. But she had something more, she asked me to recall how I had carried her into out bridal room on our wedding day.

She requested that every day for the month's duration I carry her out of our bedroom to the front door every morning. I thought she was going crazy. Just to make our last days together bearable I accepted her odd request.

I told Jane about my wife's divorce conditions. She laughed loudly and thought it was absurd. No matter what tricks she applies, she must face the divorce, she said scornfully.

My wife and I hadn't had any body contact since my divorce intention was explicitly expressed. So, when I carried her out on the first day, we both appeared clumsy. Our son clapped behind us, "daddy is holding mommy in his arms". His words brought me a sense of pain. From the bedroom to the sitting room, then to the door, I walked over ten meters with her in my arms. She closed her eyes and said softly; don't tell our son about the divorce. I nodded, feeling somewhat upset. I put her down outside the door. She went to wait for the bus to work. I drove alone to the office.

On the second day, both of us acted much more easily. She leaned on my chest. I could smell the fragrance of her blouse. I realized that I hadn't looked at this woman carefully for a long time. I realized she was not young anymore. There were fine wrinkles on her face, her hair was graying! Our marriage had taken its toll on her. For a minute I wondered what I had done to her. On the fourth day, when I lifted her up, I felt a sense of intimacy returning. This was the woman who had given ten years of her life to me.

On the fifth and sixth day, I realized that our sense of intimacy was growing again. I didn't tell Jane about this. It became easier to carry her as the month slipped by. Perhaps the everyday workout made me stronger.

She was choosing what to wear one morning. She tried on quite a few dresses but could not find a suitable one. Then she sighed, all my dresses have grown bigger. I suddenly realized that she had grown so thin, that was the reason why I could carry her more easily.

Suddenly it hit me... she had buried so much pain and bitterness in her heart. Subconsciously I reached out and touched her head.

Our son came in at that moment, and said, "Dad, it's time to carry mom out". To him, seeing his father carrying his mother out had become an essential part of his life. My wife gestured to our son to come closer and hugged him tightly. I turned my face away because I was afraid, I might change my mind at this last minute. I then held her in my arms, walking from the bedroom, through the sitting room, to the hallway. Her hand surrounded my neck softly and naturally. I held her body tightly; it was just like our wedding day.

But her much lighter weight made me sad. On the last day, when I held her in my arms, I could hardly move a step. Our son had gone to school. I held her tightly and said, I hadn't noticed that our life lacked intimacy.

I drove to office... jumped out of the car swiftly without locking the door. I was afraid any delay would make me change my mind... I walked upstairs. Jane opened the door and I said to her, Sorry, Jane, I do not want the divorce anymore.

She looked at me, astonished, and then touched my forehead. Do you have a fever? She said. I moved her hand off my head. Sorry, Jane, I said, I won't divorce. My marriage was boring probably because she and I didn't value the details of our lives, not because we didn't love each other anymore. Now I realize that since I carried her into my home on our wedding day I am supposed to hold her until death do us apart.

Jane seemed to suddenly wake up. She gave me a loud slap and then slammed the door and burst into tears. I walked downstairs and drove away.

At the floral shop on the way, I ordered a bouquet of flowers for my wife. The salesgirl asked me what to write on the card. I smiled and wrote... I'll carry you out every morning until death do us apart.

That evening I arrived home, flowers in my hands, a smile on my face, I run up stairs, only to find my wife in the bed – dead.

My wife had been fighting CANCER for months and I was so busy with Jane to even notice. She knew that she would die soon and she wanted to save me from the whatever negative reaction from our son, in case we push thru with the divorce —At least, in the eyes of our son— I'm a loving husband...

The small details of your lives are what really matter in a relationship. It is not the mansion, the car, property, or the money in the bank. These create an environment conducive for happiness but cannot give happiness in themselves. Find time to be your spouse's friend and do those little things for each other that build intimacy. Have a real happy marriage! The Sacred Scriptures do help us to know the secret of the happy marriage.

Today's Sacred Scripture Readings bring us together to reflect on the Sacrament of Marriage where people join to become husband and wife and later father and mother as they enjoy the company of their children. God has sketched his original plan for the marriage in the First Reading today "Therefore a man shall leave his father and his mother and hold fast to his wife, and they shall be one flesh". How amazing is the sketch where husband and wife are depicted as one? According to the Holy Bible marriage is not a contract or agreement between people but it's a covenant which each couple makes with God. They not only say yes to each other but give themselves to the Lord as well. Prophet Malachi highlights the covenant of marriage in this way "Have we not all one father? Has not one God created us? Why then are we faithless to one another, profaning the covenant of our ancestors? So, look to yourselves, and do not let anyone be faithless to the wife of his youth. For I hate divorce, says the Lord, the God of Israel" (2:10-16).

In the Gospel our Lord reconfirms the sacrament of marriage which was instituted by God who created Adam and Eve and blessed them. The words of Jesus "Therefore what God has joined together, let no one separate "put seal to any division in the marriage. The real marriage is compared with the love of Jesus to Church. The Letters of St. Paul and St. Peter emphasize on the importance of marriage which is the source of bringing nonbeliever spouses to the Lord through Christian way of life. Holy Father Pope Francis once reflecting on the Sacrament of Marriage showed his frustration and sadness "today we experience the paradox of a globalized world filled with luxurious mansions and skyscrapers, but a lessening of the warmth of homes and families; many ambitious plans and projects, but little time to enjoy them; many

sophisticated means of entertainment, but a deep and growing interior emptiness; many pleasures, but few loves; many liberties, but little freedom... The number of people who feel lonely keeps growing, as does the number of those who are caught up in selfishness, gloominess, destructive violence and slavery to pleasure and money".

Today we can see that marriages are falling apart for two main reasons: First love is being replaced by lust. For many people marriages have become mere piece of paper, entertainment, and party. Secondly couples are failing to understand one another. Everyone wants to go his/her own way without supporting and caring each for other. People are less and less serious about building a solid and fruitful relationship of love: in sickness and in health, for better and for worse, in good times and in bad are the promises couple make before the Lord on the day of with wedding. But how many keep these promises? I have counselled many couples and help them realize and recognize each other's presence. Following are a few suggestions, I place before them:

- 1. Recall the memories of your first date/meeting.
- 2. What attracted you to say, "Will you marry me?"
- 3. Remember the word "Yes" and break into Your love in my life always bring Excitement which helps me to Say you are mine.
- 4. Before you go to bed, hold hands together and pray for each other and thank the Lord for your love, support, and care.
- 5. Share your love story with your children to let them know the real meaning of marriage and the journey of love you are on.
- 6. If you are upset or angry, open your heart to each other and share your heart out and feelings.
- 7. Learn to ignore minor faults and forgive one another before you go to sleep
- 8. Learn to respect one another in a time when one is showing weakness or trouble.
- 9. Give all your worries to the Lord and place weak moments of your marriage under the foot of the Cross.

10. Keep asking this question "why did I marry him/her and am I doing everything right to

support him/her?"

There are so many other aspects of marriage we can discuss or say but let's ask the intercession of Blessed Virgin Mary as we begin the month of October to honour her, to help all the married couples to realize the presence of the Lord in their lives so that their love journey help their children to be strong in their lives. St. Paul says, "Love never ends".

#### Statement of Apology by the Catholic Bishops of Canada to the Indigenous Peoples of This Land

We, the Catholic Bishops of Canada, gathered in Plenary this week, take this opportunity to affirm to you, the Indigenous Peoples of this land, that we acknowledge the suffering experienced in Canada's Indian Residential Schools. Many Catholic religious communities and dioceses participated in this system, which led to the suppression of Indigenous languages, culture and spirituality, failing to respect the rich history, traditions and wisdom of Indigenous Peoples. We acknowledge the grave abuses that were committed by some members of our Catholic community; physical, psychological, emotional, spiritual, cultural, and sexual. We also sorrowfully acknowledge the historical and ongoing trauma and the legacy of suffering and challenges faced by Indigenous Peoples that continue to this day. Along with those Catholic entities which were directly involved in the operation of the schools and which have already offered their own heartfelt apologies¹, we², the Catholic Bishops of Canada, express our profound remorse and apologize unequivocally.

We are fully committed to the process of healing and reconciliation. Together with the many pastoral initiatives already underway in dioceses across the country, and as a further tangible expression of this ongoing commitment, we are pledging to undertake fundraising in each region of the country to support initiatives discerned locally with Indigenous partners. Furthermore, we invite the Indigenous Peoples to journey with us into a new era of reconciliation, helping us in each of our dioceses across the country to prioritize initiatives of healing, to listen to the experience of Indigenous Peoples, especially to the survivors of Indian Residential Schools, and to educate our clergy, consecrated men and women, and lay faithful, on Indigenous cultures and spirituality. We commit ourselves to continue the work of providing documentation or records that will assist in the memorialization of those buried in unmarked graves.

Having heard the requests to engage Pope Francis in this reconciliation process, a delegation of Indigenous survivors, Elders/knowledge keepers, and youth will meet with the Holy Father in Rome in December 2021. Pope Francis will encounter and listen to the Indigenous participants, so as to discern how he can support our common desire to renew relationships and walk together along the path of hope in the coming years. We pledge to work with the Holy See and our Indigenous partners on the possibility of a pastoral visit by the Pope to Canada as part of this healing journey.

We commit ourselves to continue accompanying you, the First Nations, Métis and Inuit Peoples of this land. Standing in respect of your resiliency, strength and wisdom, we look forward to listening to and learning from you as we walk in solidarity.



#### October - Month of the Holy Rosary

Some attribute the association between October and Mary to the devotion to Our Lady of Fatima. On October 13,1917, in Cova de Iria outside of Fatima, Portugal, the last of six monthly Marian apparitions to three hepherd children is said to have taken place. October 7 is the feast day of Our Lady of the Rosary. It began as the feast of OurLady of Victory, instituted in 1571 after a Christian military victory in the Battle of Lepanto. In1573, this feast day was renamed Our Lady of the Rosary by Pope Gregory XIII, and in 1716,Our Lady of the Rosary was celebrated as a feast of the universal Church for the first time.

In October, in a special way, we remember Mary both as Mother of God and as our mother. This month includes the feasts of Our Lady of the Rosary (Oct. 7), as well as those of St. John Paul II (Oct. 22), and of a Canadian Blessed Marie-Rose Durocher (Oct. 6), both great devotees of Mary.
