



The heart of eucharistic celebration is the mystery of Christ, commonly summed up as the Paschal Mystery. That mystery flows out from the hidden mystery of God's saving plan of redeeming love fully revealed and enacted in the person and mission of Christ. His mission to announce and spread that love is entrusted to us in turn. Liturgical celebration of the Paschal Mystery is formative, it is "the cradle of the three attitudes that generate a Eucharistic culture, for it impels us to express in our way of life and our thinking the grace of Christ who gave of himself to the full" (Pope Francis).

All lay volunteers of the Diocese of Calgary are invited to the National Liturgy Webinar to be spiritually nourished for service during this period of the fourth wave of the pandemic. We will look at ritual actions and symbols, along with select texts, for gathering, listening, presenting gifts, sharing bread and wine, and being sent on mission. We will trace themes of what we bring and offer, and of finding our life stories within our master story. That story calls us to be a living sacrifice of praise, to do what Jesus commanded at the Last Supper, to join him in saying and living his Amen to God and to the world. THROUGH HIS SUFFERING...

St. Paul says "No testing has overtaken you that is not common to everyone. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tested beyond your strength, but with the testing he will also provide the way out so that you may be able to endure it" which is a beautiful reminder that our sufferings are the end of our relationship with the Lord. What is our response as Christians to suffering? Why is there suffering when Lord loves us so much? Why did Jesus suffer when he is Son of God? Why do good people suffer when there is no deceit found in them? What causes suffering in our lives? There are so many other questions we hear everyday. I guess most of the time our life runs around with too many whys and most of the time we find no answer to these "whys". In facing life's great 'whys?', we have two paths: either stay and wistfully contemplate past and present sepulchres or allow Jesus to approach our sepulchres. Yes, because each one of us already has a small sepulchre, some area that has somewhat died within our hearts; a wound, a wrongdoing endured or inflicted, an unrelenting resentment, a regret that keeps coming back, a sin we cannot overcome. Today, let us identify these little sepulchres that we have inside, and let us invite Jesus into them. It is curious, but we often prefer to be alone in the dark caves within us rather than invite Christ inside them. We are tempted to always seek solutions for ourselves, brooding and sinking into anguish, licking our wounds, instead of going to him, who says, "Come to me, all who labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest", (Mt 11:28). Let us not be held captive by the temptation to remain alone and discouraged, crying about what is happening to us. Let us not give in to the useless and inconclusive logic of fear, resignedly repeating that everything is going badly, and nothing is as it once was. This is the sepulchral atmosphere. The Lord instead wishes to open the path of life, that of encounter with him, of trust in him, of the resurrection of the heart, the way of: "Arise, Arise, come out". This is what the Lord asks of us, and he is by our side to do so. However sometimes we fail to recognize that through his suffering we have been saved "Cast all your anxiety on him, because he cares for you" as St. Peter says. Once a man went to his barber's shop. Barber and man often used to talk about various topics like politics, sports etc. Today, they started to talk about existence of God. Barber said, "I don't believe in God's existence." Man asked, "Why?" Barber said, "Just look down the street and you will understand that there is no God. There are so many people who are ill. So many orphan

kids, helpless old people, war going on and so on. There is so much pain and suffering. You tell me if God was there, then there would be so much wrong happening in the world. Barber continued, "I can't believe in existence of such God who would allow all such things in this world. Tell me where God is?" Man thought for a moment but then kept quiet to stop continuing the debate of this topic. Barber completed his work and man left from shop.

After walking a short distance, man stopped. After a while he saw a poor middle-aged man with big beard and mustache. It seemed like that man hadn't bathed or washed for long time. Man immediately went to barber's shop. He went inside and spoke. "You know, there are no barbers in this world!" Barber laughed and said, "how can you say so, I am here, standing in front of you!" Man said, "No, there are no barbers because if it was so..."

Just at that time, that middle aged man walked by barber's shop. Man pointed toward him and said, "you see that man and his long beard and mustache. How is that possible if there are barbers?" Barber replied, "Brother, there are barbers but there are many people who don't come to barber." Just then man said, "absolutely right, similarly God exist but people don't go to God. They don't believe him or trust him, that's why there is so much pain and suffering in this world".

There are two questions that have often left people confused and bewildered. One is, why does God allow bad things happen to good people; and the second is, why does God allow good things happen to bad people. We are often confused to why it seems that good things are always happening to godless people, but on the other hand, bad things are always happening to godly people. Let me try and give you an answer to those questions. As for the reason why, God allows good things to happen to bad people, the explanation is in one word, the word mercy. There is no other way to explain it. God is a merciful God. Jesus said, "He makes His sun to rise on the evil and on the good and send rain on the just and on the unjust" (Matt 5:45). The same concept of mercy we can see in the First Reading as we reflect on the Song of the Suffering Servant; "It was the will of the Lord to crush him with pain". Does it make any sense to us that God himself allowing his Son to suffer? Is suffering end of our life or relationships? Jesus did suffer and died only to give us eternal life and that life change us to see him as he is as we read in the Letter to Hebrews. Through his suffering we have been saved for eternity because he bore our iniquities onto him.

As for the question, why does God allow bad things to happen to good people, the answer is in the word ministry. St. Peter tells us that God has a ministry in our suffering. He says, "And after you have suffered for a little while, the God of all grace, who has called you to his eternal glory in Christ, will himself restore, support, strengthen, and establish you. To him be the power forever and ever. Amen" (1 Peter 5:10-11).

Many years ago the Rev. A.J. Gordon was pastor of a church in Boston. One day he set a battered old bird cage on the pulpit and proceeded to use it for a never-to-be-forgotten object lesson.

The pastor explained how he met a little boy carrying several little birds in that rusty cage.

[&]quot;Son, where did you get those birds?"

[&]quot;I trapped them out in the field," the boy answered.

[&]quot;What are you going to do with them?" the preacher asked.

[&]quot;I'm going to take them home and play with them."

[&]quot;What will you do with them when you get through playing with them?" Rev. Gordon asked.

"Oh," said the boy, "I guess I'll just feed them to an old cat we have around the house."

Gordon asked the boy how much he would take for the birds?

"Mister, you don't want these birds. They're just little old field birds and they can't sing very well."

"I'll give you \$2 for the cage and the birds," the churchman offered.

"All right," said the boy, "It's a deal, but you're making a bad mistake."

The exchange was made, and the boy went whistling down the street, happy because he had \$2 in his pocket. Gordon took the cage out behind his church, opened the cage door, and let the birds fly out. They went soaring into the blue, singing as they went.

That Sunday, with cage in hand, Rev. Gordon illustrated by analogy a typical dialogue between Jesus Christ and Satan. One day at the dawn of civilization Satan set a trap in the Garden of Eden. Adam and Eve fell for it - they sinned, and they were entrapped in Satan's cage.

One day Jesus asked, "What are you going to do with all the human race in that cage?"

"I'm going to tease them, have fun with them and make them think this is all they can hope for," said Satan.

"What will you do then?" asked Jesus.

"I'll torment them in hell forever," said Satan.

Jesus then asked Satan how much he wanted for those trapped human beings.

"Oh, you don't want them. They're dirty, cruel, and uncaring. They will curse you, spit on you and drive spikes into your body," Satan responded.

"Never mind. How much?"

"All your heart and all your blood - your very life in exchange," Satan said.

And Jesus paid it all at the cross for you and me. He redeemed us with his blood.

The door to the cage is now open for all men. But the rest of the story lies within each person, for each must now choose whether to stay in the cage and be forever lost or be set free.

This is the exact lesson we get from today's Gospel where disciples are confused with the concept of power and high rank but Jesus on the other hand is giving them lifelong lesson to be ready to die for other. There is very interesting movie called "Quo Vadis" (1951) which means "where are you going". This movie is about the persecution of Christians in Jerusalem and St. Peter is leaving the city during suffering and Jesus meets with St. Peter and St. Peter asks him "Quo Vadis? and Jesus answers him back saying "I am going back to Jerusalem to suffer again for my people.

The opportunity is given to him by the brothers James and John, two of the very first whom Jesus met and called to follow him. By now they have gone quite a long way with him and in fact belong to the group of the 12 Apostles. Therefore, while they are on their way to Jerusalem — where the disciples anxiously hope that on the occasion of the celebration of Passover, Jesus will at last establish the Kingdom of God — the two brothers take courage, approach the Teacher and make their request: "Grant us to sit, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your glory".

Jesus knows that James and John are inspired by great enthusiasm for him and for the cause of the Kingdom, but he also knows that their expectations and their zeal are tarnished by the spirit of the world. Thus, he responds: "You do not know what your are asking". And as they are speaking of 'thrones of glory' on which to sit beside Christ the King, he speaks of a "cup" to be


drunk, of a "baptism" to be received, that is, his passion and death. James and John, always aiming at the hoped-for privilege, say in an outburst: yes, "we are able"! But here too, they do not truly understand what they are saying. Jesus forewarns that they will drink his cup and receive his baptism, that is, that they too, like the other Apostles, will take part in his cross, when their time comes. However, Jesus concludes: "to sit at my right hand or at my left is not mine to grant, but it is for those for whom it has been prepared".

Jesus suffered and became obedient to the death and death on the Cross but taught us a lesson that we should not be lost in the worldly mentality of suffering which is being considered the end of everything but have the mind of God that our suffering brings us closer to God. It is easy to say, "why me Lord when we suffer but difficult to say thank you Lord for all your blessings". Once a group of friends who were now highly established in their work decided to meet one of their professors from university. So, one day they all went together to visit their old university professor. When they met the professor, they all started to share about their life and work but soon all this turned into complaints and stress in life and work. After a while the professor went into kitchen to bring coffee for the guests. He returned with a large pot of coffee and a variety of cups-made of different materials. After he placed the coffee pot and cups on table, he told his students to help themselves to the coffee.


After all the students had a cup of coffee in their hands. The professor said "if you all noticed, you can see that all the expensive looking cups are taken away leaving the plain or cheap ones on table. Its' normal for all of you to want the best for yourselves but what you are not able to

see is that is the source of all your problems and stress." He continued "you all know that the cup itself adds no quality the taste of coffee. What you all wanted was just coffee to drink not the cup but still consciously you all went for the best cups and then you began to eye each other's cups".

Let's focus our eyes on him by whose suffering have been saved.

World Mission Sunday - Oct. 24

At the initiative of Pope Pius XI in 1926, the second last Sunday during October became known as World Mission Sunday. Catholics throughout the world are invited to pray for and give to the missions. The collection this Sunday is organized by the Pontifical Missions Society. The funds collected assist some 1,250 mission dioceses under the responsibility of the Congregation for the Evangelization of Peoples. As agreed by the Holy See and the Bishops of Canada, a portion of the Canadian contributions to this collection will continue to be used until 2020 to assist six dioceses in Northern Canada which for many years had also been under the jurisdiction of the Congregation.



On the day of the collection (weekend of Oct. 23/24, 30th Sunday of Ordinary Time), an appropriate petition may be added in the Prayer of the Faithful. The Mass for the Evangelization for Peoples may be celebrated on this Sunday (Roman Missal, pp. 1268-1270 and Lectionary: Ritual Masses, Masses for Various Needs and Occasions, Votive Masses, Masses for the Dead, pp. 482-496 (nos. 872-876).

Yet it was that devotion that nurtured Paul's compassion and supported a preaching ministry that touched the hearts of many listeners. Read more


